This commission was co-chaired by former governor/senator of Florida Bob Graham and former governor/congressmen of Delaware Mike Castle and included two state legislators, five university presidents and five private sector CEOs. The purpose was to develop a set of pragmatic policy options that states could use to incentivize universities and colleges to become more cost-effective and increase access and graduation rates all students but particularly for low income and students of color. The Commission released ten policy white papers during 2016 and the final report entitled Investing in the Future: Sharing Responsibility for higher Education Attainment was released in December, 2016.

Currently I am teaching two courses each year including State and Federal Budgeting and the Applied Policy Project or the capstone for the MPP students. Also, I have taught Health Care, Leadership in the Public Arena several short courses on crisis management, budgeting and governors as leaders.

During the last several years I have organized and hosted retreats for both Governor McAuliffe and Governor McDonnell at the Batten School. Both of the full day retreats focused on finishing strong in the final year. I also hosted the final governors debate working with staff at the University of Virginia at Wise in November, 2018. Currently, I am discussing the possibility of the Batten School doing an issue and leadership seminar for new members of the Virginia House of Delegates after the next election with the bipartisan leadership in the House of Delegates.

As chief executive, I was responsible for managing all facets of this 100-staff member association of the 55 Governors of the states, territories, and commonwealths of the United States. The association, which had a \$33.4 million budget, had three missions. First, to assist Governors and their staff in developing and implementing a wide range of state policies in education, economic development, housing, job training, health and social services, transportation and environmental protection. Second, to influence federal legislation and regulations on behalf of state governments. This requires testifying and lobbying both the Congress and the administration on key issues. Third, to assist Governors in becoming stronger mangers and leaders.
